REPATRIATION PROCESS FOR THE DECEASED IRISH CITIZENS OF INDIAN ORIGIN¹

Procedure:

- 1. Hospital to issue a death declaration form stating the cause of the death.
- 2. If Post-mortem is performed, Coroner (State Pathologist) will issue the same.
- 3. Take the death declaration form to the local Death and Birth Registration Centre.
- 4. Family members or the next of kin should be present to sign the form for death registration. Death certificates costs €20 per certificate. Its recommended to buy three certificates at least.
- 5. Submit the details of person who will be receiving the deceased in India with their passport details to the funeral home.
- 6. Obtain the following certificates from the funeral home:
 - a. Embalming certificate
 - b. Funeral directors declaration
 - c. Coroners certificate for clearance from non-infectious diseases
 - d. Coroners certificate to clearance of body outside Ireland.

- 7. Present to the Dept. of Foreign Affairs, Passport Office Building, Molesworth Street, Dublin 2 or 1A, South Mall, Cork with all the above documents.
- 8. Dept. of Foreign Affairs (DFA) authenticates and attests all the relevant Irish documents.
- 9. However, DFA doesn't authenticate the passport and embalming certificate.
- 10. You have to get the Irish passport and embalming certificate attested by the notary public first.
- 11. DFA authenticates the passport and embalming certificate post notary public's attestation.
- 12. Completion of this process, establishes that Republic of Ireland has cleared to repatriate the deceased.
- 13. Authentication costs€ 40 per page.
- 14. Present to the Indian embassy with the all the above documents.
- 15.Indian embassy is not entitled to issue non-objection letter or permit letter for repatriation of deceased Irish citizens of Indian origin to

India. It's the ambassador's sole discretion to issue the nonobjection letter.

- 16. However, clearance from Indian Embassy in the form of permit or non-objection letter is a must for transferring the deceased via cargo.
- 17. Once clearance from the Indian Embassy is obtained hand over all the documents back to the Funeral Home with the passport and OCI.
- 18. Funeral home will issue airway bill and flight details.
- 19. Consignee to claim for the deceased in the Local airport with proper identification (preferably passport)
